Cristian Avram (b. 1994, Alba-Iulia, Romania) currently lives and works in Cluj-Napoca. He obtained his BFA and MFA in painting from the University of Art and Design in Cluj Napoca, Romania in 2019, and in 2017 he was the recipient of Zorzini Gallery Prize and Plan-B Foundation Prize.

Prior to opening in London, the gallery set up a charitable foundation 'Workplace Foundation' in Newcastle to leave a lasting legacy in the North East of England. Committed to ideas of diversity and community, the ethos of the Foundation runs through the gallery, with a continued wish to represent the work of artists whose practices reflect the multiplicity of voices that constitute our society today.
